THE IAF LEGACY

The International Anglican Fellowship LLC was established in early 1980 by the late Archbishop Louis Falk of the Anglican Church in America. It was Archbishop Falk's desire to provide financial assistance to churches worldwide as a missionary outreach program of the Anglican Church in America (ACA). In 1988, the ACA and many of the worldwide Traditional Anglican Churches, some supported in part by the International Anglican Fellowship, voted to become members of the newly formed Traditional Anglican Communion (recently repurposed as the Traditional Anglican Church) with Archbishop Louis Falk (ACA) elected as its first Primate. It was in this way, that the IAF became *the missionary arm of the Traditional Anglican Church*.

The International Anglican Fellowship is managed day-to-day by an Executive Director. Archbishop Louis Falk was the founder and IAF's first Executive Director. Bishop Tex Hudson (ACA) became the second Executive Director, followed by Mr. Walter Killian, a prominent New Hampshire businessman. Upon the passing of Wal-

ter Killian in late 2007, the position of IAF Executive Director was taken up by Mr. Peter Thomas, of Conway, New Hampshire. From its early inception the base of operations of the IAF was centered in New Hampshire, but in 2011, the IAF Board of Directors moved the IAF center of operations to Montana in the ACA Diocese of the West under the direction of Erv Lischke. Upon Erv's retirement, and in consultation with the TAC worldwide College of Bishops, the IAF moved again, this time to New York where it is now based in West Seneca under the direction of The Very Rev. Canon Edward Ihde, Regional Dean of New York and Rector of Saint Nicholas Anglican Church in Williamsville, NY.

The work of the International Anglican fellowship is charitable in nature, to which donors' gifts are fully deductible under the IRS rules through its 501c(3) status. The IAF's primary function is in connecting donors who are interested in worldwide mission to traditional Anglican jurisdictions and other churches in need of supplementary income for the purposes of continuing mission, clergy education and Christian development.

The IAF is governed by a Board of Directors including TAC bishops, priests, deacons and laypeople currently resident in the U.S. and Canada. The current President of the Board of Directors is Bishop Brian Marsh (ACA). Helping to facilitate the transfer of IAF funding is the Bank of Rhode Island whose corporate presence in New York is known as Citizens Bank N.A. It is through Citizens Bank and a supplementary bank, Bank of America, that funds are received in several different currencies from many countries of the world, accounted for, and then transmitted in U.S. Dollars through bank-to-bank wire

transfers and registered mail to IAF recipients. It is the job of the Executive Director to manage IAF funds by collecting and distributing funds in the most cost-effective way possible.

Besides the standard IAF sponsored church groups, over the years there have been special 'designated' projects that have recently gained the attention of many of our IAF donors. The designated program began with the special earthquake funding in Puerto Rico five years ago but today has begun to receive the attention of jurisdictions outside the Traditional Anglican Church as well, including the G3 group, the Anglican Church of North America (ACNA) and the Orthodox Anglican Church as well as the Baptist Church in America. It is through these unaffiliated groups that the IAF has been able to initiate several new projects including our new Disaster Fund spurred by recent Hurricanes in the U.S., a new Anglican Church plant in Uganda for Sudan War refugees, and a Farsi Speaking Anglican Church plant in Indonesia. It is possible that this year – 2025 - we will see donations and gift revenue for standard and special IAF project assistance exceed \$100,000.00 for the first time in IAF history. This accomplishment is a validation of the trust our donors have in the IAF today, compared to the less than \$2,000 revenue gathered in 2012, which was the lowest point in IAF financial history.

Please continue to pray for this vital ministry of the Traditional Anglican Church and . . . of course, donate to it as you are able. 97% of all donations go directly to help churches, programs and people in need.

Dear Fr. Ed+

We held our first Jakarta communion service in about 2 years this week. I finally got papers approved and my visa is now good for multiple entries into Indonesia.

Visited many members and friends of PAC, and got to visit the learning Lab which is operating 6 days per week, alternating between male and female. refugee teenagers who study there using Khan Academy material, a substitute for the schooling they are missing.

We have a new location inside of the Greenbay Mall for our North Jakarta worship service which will now continue in person as much as possible.

Our Farsi men are planning to worship in person as well. We are studying the best location and arrangements for that.

I was unable to get to Bali to visit our Canggu congregation this trip. A priest from Australia will visit them during Holy Week and lead worship as God allows on Good Friday and Easter.

One former Bali attendee is a woman named Ika, a former Java Muslim. She has had three spiritually impactful dreams. In the third dream a priest approached her and said, "I know that you have been hurt." She cried and said she knows that she needs to forgive. She is keen now to be baptized and we are trying to arrange it this summer for her.

Pictures are from the special needs school, a coworker meeting, mass, Learning Lab and some random visits.

Hope some of these are helpful.

Report from THE YNET ANGLICAN CHURCH IN UGANDA

This report covers the months of April and May which had been very busy for us as a church. The church had been observing the Lenten period that started in early March with Ash Wednesday. On April 13, we celebrated Palm Sunday, marking the triumphant entry of Jesus Christ to Jerusalem with Christians waving their palm branches. Thereafter the Holy Week started and had to take the Christians through the teaching for two hours each day until Good Friday. A full service was conducted on the Good Friday, teaching the congregation the importance of this day, culminating on Easter Sunday or resurrection Sunday, which is a Christian festival commemorating the resurrection of Jesus from the dead, described in the New Testament as having occurred on the third day of his burial following his crucifixion by the Romans at Calvary in c. 33 AD. At YWC Christians sang praising songs and jubilating the savior's resurrection to save humankind from their sins.



Revival Convention at YWC

A Revival Convention was held for three days (2nd to 4th May, 2025). The Convention attracted people from Adjumani, Moyo and Obongi districts of Northern Uganda. It was held under the transformative theme: "Restoration and Rebuilding of Broken Lives and Communities," inspired by Isaiah 58:12: "Your people will rebuild the ancient ruins and will raise up the age-old foundation; you will be called Repairer of Broken Walls, Restorer of Streets with Dwellings." This convention was called for the people to come together in prayer, worship, and dedication as we seek God's guidance and power to heal, rebuild, and restore. Our nation, South Sudan, has endured times of great hardship, and yet we have hope. Now is the time to stand as one body, allowing the Holy Spirit to renew our communities, restore broken hearts, and empower each of us to be agents of change and peace.

Many inspiring preachers preached boldly as the Holy Spirit used them and taking deep moments of worship, collective prayers as people pursue God's purpose for the region and reignite the flames of faith, compassion and unity. The message was clear: let us work together to restore lives, renew our communities, and rebuild the spiritual and social foundations that will strengthen generations to come. Many people, 43 of them gave their lives to Jesus Christ, crying for the forgiveness of their sins as they walked to the cross of Jesus Christ. The convention was attended by 732 people, excluding children.

Infant baptism and Muslim woman convert baptized

Yenet Worship Centre conducts baptism of infants and adults every three months. Nine children were baptized. One Muslim woman convert to Christianity was also baptized. She had to undergo Catechism classes for a period of one month before she could be baptized. This preparation was necessary to make her grounded in the Anglican faith together with others who wanted such important training.



Building Report from THE YNET ANGLICAN CHURCH IN UGANDA

I am writing to update you on the progress of the roofing project at the Yenet Worship Centre church. As you are aware, we received funding from the Bellevue Heights Foundation, through the IAF. We are pleased to announce the successful completion of the roofing project at the church. The project was made possible through the generous support of the Bellevue Heights Foundation including \$25,000 for construction and an additional \$12,000 specifically for the roof.



I am pleased to report that the roof construction is now complete.

CHOLERA DISASTER Averted in March 2025

Sustaining Members

The IAF Sustaining Member program was begun in 2012 as a tool to formally recognize those churches and individuals that support the Fellowship on a recurring basis. For example, if one of the line items in a church budget contains a donation to the IAF, that church is eligible to become a Sustaining Member. Similarly, individuals or families who desire to provide support on a regular basis can be recognized as Sustaining Members.

This program helps to give the IAF Board of Directors an idea of how to plan distribution of donated funds for Traditional Anglican Church missionary projects and to target those projects that are most in need. As a token of appreciation, Sustaining Members are presented with a wall plaque (shown to the right) ... a tangible example of commitment and caring.
